The Bell at St. John's, Kenn

Our church bell at Kenn has been sounded in special ways recently to mark two very different occasions.

The first of these was on Sunday 18th. June which was our first service following the Thanksgiving service at Yatton (the previous day) for our well loved Rev. Mary Welsh.

In olden days it was custom to sound "Nine Tellers"* for the death of a man on the deepest note bell, but only six for a woman.

All of these were done in groups of three. I was a bit perturbed whether to use six, or more, as there seemed to have been no special number for a priest.

These "Tellers" were then followed by one strike of the bell for each year of the dead person's age, and this we did for Mary, sounding 84 times on two separate occasions before our morning service.

By the way, Mike Callow has also used this approach, he tells me, when ringing for a couple of funerals at Kenn in recent years.

"The "Nine Tellers" became corrupted over the years to "The

Nine Tailors" – the title of a gruesome murder story by Dorothy L. Sayers which was traced to death from the prolonged sound of a peal of bells within the confines

of the bell chamber of a Fenland church, - you may have heard of, or even read, this book.

The second occasion was at John Andrew's celebration service at Kenn on the morning of Sunday 9th. July. This time it was a joyous affair so the bell was rung both before and after service in sequences of 25 rings on four separate occasions, interspersed before service with our "Angelus" (John says it reminds him of this) i.e. the groups of 3 strikes signifying that the service is Holy Communion.

On a similar vein, I have been asked why we ring the bell at the blessing of the bread & wine. Again this was an ancient custom, still kept alive in a very few churches, of letting those who couldn't for any reason come to church, know that this most important part of the service had been reached. Far more sense, I feel, than ringing a tinkling consecration 'gong' inside the church, I hope you agree!

Parish Council Notes

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 7th August in the Village Hall. All parishioners are very welcome and have an opportunity to speak at the meeting.

Summer Walk

The July Summer Walk took place on a rather damp, but pleasant evening. Around 42 people of all ages met at "Castle Farm" Clevedon which extends to around 100 acres of very sloping land, sweeping down to the Clevedon to Portishead coastal path.

Jeff Naish is tenant of this farm and keeps a flock of sheep and a herd of breeding horses there.

Many of these are of the Appaloosa breed of spotted colouring. Most of the mares have foals with them, which were born this spring.

It is thought that, say 150 years ago, this was a huge farm,

incorporating which is now the Golf Course and most of Walton St. Mary.

If you look around this area there is only one ancient building there; St. Mary's Church. All the other buildings are of Victorian or later design. This farm probably extended down to where the Walton Park Hotel stands and beyond towards the Pier.

Jeff explained that some of the mares kept on Castle Farm are unmanageable and only suitable for breeding. They breed a foal each year.

People admired the pure breed Appaloosa stallion that is the head of the herd.

Walkers enjoyed the long trek across the farm, which stretches from Ladye Bay to the Clevedon to Portishead coastal road.

While we were on the walk two ships sailed by on the deep water of Walton Bay. At this point they get very near the coast. We were very pleased to welcome several new walkers.

The next walk has been arranged for August 14th. We hope to visit "Bullocks Farm", Kingston Seymour. We meet at Cloverlea, Kenn Street at 7 pm, or if you live at Kingston meet at "Bulbeck", Bullock Lane.

Bird News I

Following my comments last month, there have been several sightings of Hobbies. One was over Dowlais Farm, another, was reported by John Croxton, over fields between Duck Lane and Kenn Moor Road and there have also been sightings near Littlewood on Kenn Moor. Details of any further sightings will be gratefully received.

John also reports breeding success for Little Owls in the field behind his house. There is at least one and probably two young.

Whilst Tawny Owls and Barn Owls are enduring a very poor season, Little Owls seem to be faring better. It has been suggested that the rain in May helped, making a lot of earthworms available at a critical time.

The Clevedon Peregrine Falcons have fledged one youngster (a baby 'girl!'). She was alternatively begging for food,

stooping on an Herring Gull and chasing a Pigeon. Judging by her efforts she needs a lot more practice at the latter pursuit.

A flock of no less than thirty Mistle Thrushes were in Littlewood mid-month. They do form late summer flocks but where do they all come from? There are only odd pairs to be seen during the rest of the year.

Bird News II

Miles Naish reports that huge flocks of flying ants appeared on the Sea Wall at Kingston Seymour on 16th July. Hundreds of gulls spotted this and dive-bombed and gorged themselves all day long. Next day there was no sign of either. It has been said that this happens on just one day each year.

Young Green Woodpeckers have been heard calling all around the village this past few weeks. They must have been hatched in this area.

Len Summerell saw 2 Red Kite hovering over the orchard at Stonehouse Farm one Sunday recently. They were being mobbed by a flock of Crows.

A young Buzzard was seen in the garden at Nailsea Wall Farm.

In the river that runs from East Clevedon to Kenn Pier, there are huge shoals of large, very dark, fish, most of them are around

one foot long. They have been there for several weeks.

Young badgers are appearing everywhere, even in daylight hours. Jeff found one dead in his yard at Nailsea Wall Farm, they are probably starving. The very dry weather means there are no slugs and worms around for them to feed on, which is their staple diet.

There is a plague of young rabbits everywhere doing tremendous damage in gardens in the Russ area. There are thousands, the foxes have plenty to eat, but they still kill hens when they can get them.

Bird News III.

While trimming a bush back in our garden recently I found I had exposed what I thought was an old deserted nest.

Imagine my surprise when on closer investigation I found it contained four small turquoise blue eggs, which were warm to the touch. I put a few bits of foliage around it to try to protect it from our nearby magpie population, and got away from it a.s.a.p. hoping whatever parent bird I had probably frightened away would return.

To our delight, not only did we see a small brown/grey bird back in attendance, but a few days later 3 or 4 gaping mouths awaiting food.

Trevor informed me it was most probably a "Hedge Sparrow", or

Dunnock, and sure as faith, our bird book showed a picture of a very similar nest with eggs. It says breeding should have occurred in May-June, but our little bird obviously tried either a late brood, or one of the first brood then "had a go" too!

We hope to be able to report seeing the fledglings fly soon. Having lived in the countryside all my life, I think this is the first time I have ever knowingly seen a Dunnock.

be returned, so if it proves to be the Badmans, it can be retained for the Kenn archives.

There surely must be others but as far as I recollect Cyril Willcox, Pam Stuckey and Lucy Baker attended other schools.

Where I mention the Holdsworths etc this covers several family members. E.g. for the Naish's this covers Ray, Margaret and Daphne, the Hollymans cover two families, Betty and Phyllis and the Duck Lane Hollymans Kevin and John. The Coxes also cover two families, Irene Cox and the Coxes who

lived next to Miss Pilgrim (Jim, Sam, Elsie, Dorothy, plus younger siblings). I don't think Keith Selwyn stayed long at Kenn School. He fell and broke his collar-bone in the playground. His father blamed the state of the playground surface (unpaved rough stone) saying this caused the accident and sent Keith to school in Clevedon.

I wonder if Ray remembers Tom Williams, he was only in Kenn a short while. He lived by the Watts and

Tucker families in houses where the used car sales area now is.

Tom had spent some time in Canada as his family had gone there because of the unemployment situation in Great Britain, only to find North America was experiencing the same conditions.

I enjoyed my days at Kenn School. Miss Pilgrim was an excellent infants teacher. Mrs. Bevan was a good head teacher. She left to go on the Mission Field when her husband was ordained. I'm pretty certain they went to Trinidad.

Mrs. Bevan was followed by Mrs Griffiths, who was strict and bad behaviour was not in any way tolerated. Mrs. Griffiths took maternity leave when Jennifer was born and a Mrs James, from Southampton, took over as head.

She told us wonderful stories of the liners, which sailed from Southampton docks and filled our heads with tales of far off places.

On two occasions the school was closed because the village suffered epidemics. One year it was measles and another year it was whooping cough. My family, and I believe the

Watts family escaped these illnesses so we were able to enjoy an extra holiday period while our friends had to stay indoors and suffer.

Every year the elder scholars were invited to write an essay and submit it to the local secretary of the R.S.P.C.A. The subject was, of course, the care of animals. I kept rabbits, so it was easy enough to write about my own experiences. Trixie Gale and David Pike also wrote articles. The three of us were invited to Clevedon Cinema

where a series of films was shown after which we all received prizes, as did children from other schools.

Trixie, I am certain, won a top prize for her efforts. I still have my prize, a book entitled "Animal Ways" presented by Mrs. Vawdrey (Secretary R.S.P.C.A) at Clevedon Picture House November 5th 1937.

Kenn was a wonderful village for any child to grow up in and I treasure my childhood memories.

Dennis Goldsworthy

Dennis Goldsworthy has passed away in hospital just over 11 weeks after the death of his beloved wife Iris, to whom he had been married 57 years. He was 86 years of age.

Dennis was one of those people to whom people of today owe a great debt of gratitude for his service to this country over six years during the war years.

Dennis joined the army just before the Second World War started in 1939. He was drafted into the Royal Corps of Signals. At the outbreak of war his company was sent immediately to France. As most people know, the French and British armies were unable to cope with Hitler's huge armed force and were driven back across France when the French army was soon overrun.

The British army was driven towards the coast, mostly finishing up at Dunkirk from where around three hundred thousand troops were evacuated by sea. Dennis was one of the last to be rescued on the last day.

After landing back in England, his company was regrouped and sent to North Africa where they fought the Germans around Tunis and beat them.

When the North Africa campaign was over the troops thought they had done their share, but they were again regrouped and involved in the invasion of Italy. Dennis and his colleagues fought their way up through Italy. When the war in Europe was over they were in Austria, they eventually got back to England. Amazingly Dennis never received the many campaign medals that were due to him.

Dennis and Iris lived in Kenn for around 20 years after their retirement. They were involved in many village activities. Dennis was a Parish Councillor for many years, at one time being Vice Chairman. He was also coordinator of Kenn Street Neighbourhood Watch Scheme.

Together Dennis and Iris were great supporters of Kenn Church. For many years they opened and arranged the church for the early morning services at 8 am. Dennis was local treasurer for several years. They were great visitors to their elderly neighbours.

A few years ago Dennis and Iris moved to Clevedon to be near their daughter Jane when their health deteriorated.

Dennis' funeral was at Weston Crematorium, there were several Kenn people present. This service was conducted by the Reverend Avril Gaunt, a friend of the Goldsworthy family.

Dennis and Iris's ashes will be interred in the Churchyard here at Kenn at a later date.
