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Paralympics by the Back Door

Just before Easter I received the long-awaited phone call offering me the chance to be a Volunteer at the Paralympic Games, if I would be prepared to be a Stable Access Assistant.

I had originally applied, two years ago, to work at both the Olympics and Paralympics, but in the end was quite pleased not to be needed for the former since that meant I could enjoy going as a spectator with Sotiris and the boys.

We had been fortunate enough to get tickets for a variety of events and had a wonderfully exciting time cheering for Great Britain, Greece and Cyprus.

So on a sunny Saturday afternoon in September I found myself bowling along on the two-hour trip from our island, around Athens to find my way the Equestrian venue, a most impressive, newly completed complex with several arenas and palatial stabling for several hundred horses.

More than a week before the Opening Ceremony the place was buzzing with activity.

The teams of horses, grooms, trainers, athletes etc. were already settling in and beginning their training sessions. ‘

My gate’ is between the Grooms Village and the stables and is

also where the riders and trainers arrive by bus from the Paralympic Village on the other side of Athens.

I am therefore in a privileged position where I can meet everyone from the chief vet to the competitors, stewards and cleaners while I check their passes as they go to the stables.

The riders are an inspiring bunch, with great determination and robust humour they battle to succeed against the odds. Lacking arms or legs, or immobilized by cerebral palsy they somehow manage to persuade their mounts to perform intricate dressage manoeuvres that some of us with two arms and legs haven’t a hope of achieving. The lady with no legs is strapped to a specially adapted saddle and the lady with no arms holds the reins in her teeth. What is more they don’t expect an easy time of it, the wheelchair bound Japanese rider was bucked off her borrowed Dutch horse twice because he took exception to the music she had chosen for their routine.

Now that the competition is under way the highs and lows are felt and shared by everyone. Keeping the horses and athletes in peak fitness every day is a challenge and chance plays its role. Some deserving competitors have missed out this time, but others have

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excelled against the odds. One thing is certain no one wants Athens 2004 to end, but already the competitors are planning for Beijing.

For those of us whose involvement ends here we will never forget the camaraderie, hard work and joy of being one of the team.

BIRD NEWS I

We were pleased to see Kennites at the Littlewood Open Day on the 18th September. There were lots of Swallows and House Martins over the wood, but only occasional visits by the Hobby. I know that some people were disappointed at missing it and if the birds return next year I will try to arrange some Hobby Spotting Walks, probably in August, and these will be advertised in K N & V.

Last month, I commented on the Latin name (*Falco subbuteo*) and since then I have been asked about the English name. According to the book on the Hobby by Anthony Chapman, it was probably derived from the French verb *hober* 'to move, stir, jump about' and may be a reference to the Hobby's renowned agility of flight. The first record of the English name (then *Hoby*) was in a text dated 1440 and it assumed its current spelling in 1588. So now you know!

MORE BIRD NEWS

Tuesday 21st September 2004

Seen on the golf course close to the weir, a single Gannet. This spectacular sea bird had probably been blown up the estuary by the recent gales. It has a wing span of between 5 and 6 feet and a pale yellow head. It was being harassed by a crow and promptly took to the air and soared effortlessly over the water before settling down for a spot of fishing close to the Pill.

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Ray's Summer Walks

23 August and 6 September

Unfortunately Ray could not be with us for the first of these two walks, which was a great pity as he had arranged for us to visit Wharf Farm on the very banks of the Bristol Channel.

We met as arranged in the car park at Kingston Seymour Church and it looked as though our good luck with the weather had ended as it was pouring with rain. Arriving at the farm it was some time before the rain eased sufficiently for us to dash from our cars to the shelter of one of the farm buildings where we were welcomed by Thelma Blake who owns the farm.

Miraculously the rain that had looked set for the evening stopped and we were able to set off past Thelma's immaculate and well-stocked garden in the direction of the sea wall.

Actually there are two seawalls an old inner bank and an outer bank, which was constructed in 1984. The latter was constructed to prevent a recurrence of the floods of 1981 when the sea topped the inner wall and flooded huge areas of land including Thelma's home.

Once on the outer wall we were able to see the two wrecks just offshore that were the remains

of two ships used for target practise during the 2nd World War.



We were reminded that during this period a number of decoys were built and manned by the RAF in an attempt to divert German bombers away from their main targets in Bristol and Avonmouth.

It is believed that around 200 bombs fell in the vicinity.

One of the party mentioned that maps from around 1840 show fields where there are now mudflats and apparently Roman artefacts have also been found there.

Unlike last year when we travelled along the sea wall in luxury (tractor with trailer and straw bale seats) this year we walked and there was ample opportunity to admire the display put on by the setting sun.

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Towards the extremity of the sea wall are lakes that were made when material for the sea wall was excavated. It was at this point that a herd of cattle decided to accompany us.



Turning to the left we continued for a short way along the bank of the estuary of the River Yeo before turning left again onto the inner sea wall. In times past the inhabitants of Kingston Seymour were required to maintain allocated portions of this bank. These sections were marked with Mere stones and these can still be seen in places embedded in the bank.



Part way along the inner wall we stopped to admire some of Thelma's short horn cattle and, I for one, have never been so close to a bull before. Those that visited Thelma's farm last year remembered that she once owned a world record-breaking cow (Kingsley Musical the 3rd) that produced a total of 21,000 gallons of milk.

To end the visit we were treated to a fine display of lightning in the Clouds above Clevedon but luckily no rain.

Many thanks to Thelma for once again allowing us to visit her very special farm and to Ray for organising it.

The 6 September walk was the last walk of the season and Ray had arranged for us to visit the site of Bullbeck Manor.

Having assembled at Ray's we followed him in convoy to the Colehouse Lane end of the old Clevedon to Yatton railway line, which is now a farm access lane.

The lane brought us into the area known as Russ where we left the cars to enter a field where 70 years ago Ray had hand milked cows.

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Unusually the fields in this area do not have special names but are called 20, 7 and 10 acre. From 1930 until 1939 Ray's family had rented land here until the price went up to 2 shillings an acre.

As this was the last walk of the year we stopped here for a photograph.



Ray mentioned that at Kingston Seymour Church there is a tomb known as the Bullbeck tomb that was associated with a Thomas Kenn from around 1456.

Apparently Thomas Kenn's granddaughter married a Bullbeck. The tomb has a large brick lined chamber and may well have been used by later generations.

Close to where we stood there had been an ox-house but it was destroyed when the motorway was built.

We set off across the fields in a westerly direction until we arrived at Russ Hatch. This was constructed after the 1911 drought to ensure a water s

supply in Kingston for the cattle.

The water here is the old Kenn River.

On the other side of the river was an overgrown area, which is the site of Bullbeck Manor.

There is no longer any visible sign of the manor house but near by traces of the lane, which once led to it can be seen.

Back in 1860 William Staples was contracted to provide stone for the restoration of Kenn Church and it is believed he used stone from Bullbeck Manor. Moving them to Kenn would have been an arduous task and it is possible that they were transported by boat on the Kenn River.

Returning back across the fields Ray recalled the time when in the 20 acre field as a lad of eight he was attacked by a ram and had to be rescued.

Arriving back at the cars it was time once more to thank Ray for another interesting outing and for arranging all the previous walks throughout the summer.
