

Felt I could not let this coming Sunday go by without wishing you all a wonderful day. Wish I could be there.

My brother Alfie and I grew up in Kenn and I have so many happy memories.

In 1939, we were bombed out of our London home and evacuated to Yatton. Mrs Naish, Ray's mother met us at the station and put me on her bike as my mother wheeled Alfie in the pushchair. After brief stays in Yatton and Claverham we came to live opposite Stonehouse Farm in what was 'The Poplars' and went to Kenn School.

One day Ralph Bye said "Mrs Jones, there is an empty bungalow down the moors, there's no water, sanitation, gas or electric. Are you interested?"
We lived there for many blissful years.

The Village Hall was the centre of social life, as it still is and we would walk from Rose Bungalow on exciting frosty nights and balmy summer evenings, calling goodnight to neighbours on the way home.

Let's hope it's a warm June evening for you on Sunday. I wonder if you'll do the Palais Glide and the Okey-kokey.

Sorry about the nostalgia. We have so much to be thankful for, especially our Queen.

ROYAL TRIBUTE AND LOYAL TOAST AT KENN JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

This is a great day in our national history, surely never to be repeated.

The celebration of a sovereign's Diamond Jubilee, celebrated by millions here at home and will be watched by tens of millions worldwide with fascinated interest and I am sure some envy.

On Sunday 3rd June 2012 Kenn seemed to have a double cause for celebration. Primarily, of course, we were celebrating the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth's accession to the throne. What an honour and pride for such a small community, that we could come together and share such a fabulous unforgettable day.

In the last few weeks before the Jubilee all possible variables for what could have gone wrong could not have been accounted for. Consequently, with time flying towards the Jubilee, the event was momentarily held in suspension. In true Kenn fashion an emergency committee was established. The clock was ticking again and 2 meetings later we produced what Marianna called 'Kenn at it's very best'.

The week before June 3rd people gave generously of their time and expertise.

Robin purchased the bubbly. He also made a trip to the wholesalers for serviettes, plates table cloths etc.

Hazel, with artistry to the highest standard produced and distributed tickets and information letter. She also sourced all the champagne, beer and wine glasses.

John H went to the brewery to stock the bar.

On the 2nd June we had a fabulous preparation day. In the morning the marquee company erected the marquee. In the afternoon helpers arrived, putting up tables, assembling a walkway between the hall and the marquee, washing chairs, sorting out cutlery, setting up the bar.

Marianna, Sarah and their team produced the most elegant and tasteful table decorations and Jubilee table cloths. After several pots of tea and last-minute decision-making we locked up the village hall. All was ready.

In the morning the committee and helpers put the finishing touches to the hall. By 11am people started to arrive. Julian directed the traffic. Margaret B and Anne H were welcoming meeters and greeters. Marianna and Sarah extended the welcome by giving people a glass of bubbly. Julia directed salads and puddings to their appropriate station. People brought food with generosity, good heart and creativity.

When we were all assembled in the hall and marquee Robin addressed the crowd. He was a magnetic master of ceremonies. He thanked everyone who had helped with the fundraising and preparations. He also introduced the speech makers. John Griffin grounded us in remembering what we were celebrating. He made a thoughtful, respectful and sincere speech. Calling to mind the queen's personal qualities, her national and international work and how she attracts visitors from all over the world to the country. He proposed a toast and glasses were raised to Her Majesty. Eloise and Rosie spoke of living in Kenn and represented the young people in the village. Then a verse of 'God save the Queen' was sung.

We then assembled outside for a photograph. Robert Down made two superb records of the day. Firstly Kenn people with their family and friends. A second photo is of contemporary Kennites only.

Then it was on to the hog roast. Between the carvers judgement and abundant salads there was plenty for everyone. Including all the late applicants and people who had thought they would be away but decided to stay in Kenn instead. There was enough food for lunch including seconds, grazing and for afternoon trippers, their tea!

The puddings were outstanding. A centrepiece was Grace's delicious Jubilee Cake, topped with berries depicting the union flag. True, there was not enough room to sit everyone at a table, but people made do on benches, steps or the stage. They were happy to be part of the atmosphere.

Sizzle and Stuart kindly provided and supervised a kids tent. The children were industrious in artwork and activities. The teenagers devised games for themselves. At one time they were seen having a limbo dancing competition.

As the afternoon wore on it rained but we were all inside the marquee and it did not matter. Julia and her team made cream teas. Scones had kindly been baked by Sue Pugh and Hazel. People took their turn at the half hourly 'washer-uppers' and 'tidy-uppers' rota. No one was working in the kitchen all afternoon.

The crowd thinned and then as the evening approached thickened again as people returned or arrived for the evening band and disco. The band played old favourites such as 'Mustang Sally' and the ilk.

Simon and Jenny did what can only be described as a popup barbie. The hot dogs really hit the spot, bridging the evening hunger gap and mopping up excess beer.

James' disco was fabulous, enhanced by working with his dad who took his turn on the decks. Young and not so young dancing and playing 'name that tune' as James played records from the last 60 years. We bopped away to several 'last records.'

Thanks also to everyone who helped pull pints with John H during the day. At 12.45 we locked up the hall and marquee.

Next morning by 10.00 we were 25+ people strong. The debris was cleared up, tables put away, bar disassembled, washing up done. Special thanks to the lovely person who did the dump run with the bottles. Jilly who cleaned the toilets. Stuart's dad helped take down the kids tent. Steady work and several pots of tea later only the marquee stood. By the afternoon the marquee was also gone. The village hall and the fields were back to nought.

Down on the Farm

Fortunately the weather improved in the middle of May, making it possible for hundreds of acres of grass to be cut for silage. It's almost unbelievable the land was dry enough, after weeks of rain, so that the heavy machinery could be used.

The price of lamb for meat has dropped dramatically over the last few weeks. It is said that the financial problem in Europe is making it difficult to export them, where as last year, lambs were worth £100 each, this year they are worth around about £60. Last year the price got so high, people had difficult affording the prices. As these notes are being written the price of lamb is recovering slightly.

There are rumours that the British exporters of lamb and various other sources of meat are looking towards the Far East. The economies in those parts of the world, chiefly China are gaining ground. As the standard of living rises the people are moving towards more European cuisine. This has not gone unnoticed by countries like New Zealand and Australia who have tremendous supplies and a shorter distance to export than Britain.

On another matter the British Government have just signed a £50 million deal to supply China with meat that is not used in Great Britain such as pigs feet and heads. This is bound to help the struggling British Pork producers. These odd parts of the carcasses have always been known as the fifth quarter.

At the time these notes are being written in the second half of June, the weather has never really settled down. The best hay is supposed to be made during June, but there is not much chance of this happening this year. Of course, when the weather settles down, as it surely will, there is going to be a mad rush to get the silage making and hay making in hand.

We have been getting a few nice spring days and this has affected the throughput of animals, especially cattle through our markets. Chiefly the reason for this is when we do get a few fine days, farmers will be desperate to get the silage making done and markets become second in importance.

It is bad news for farmers living in the Somerset levels, where much of their land has been flooded to the depths of several feet. The result is that the grass that has been underwater for this long period is rotted. It is doubtful if it will be any good for farming for the next 12 months. Not only has it spoilt the land, but it has had disastrous results for ground nesting birds, whose nests of eggs and young chicks have been badly affected. Flooding on this scale has a dreadful effect for several years to come because a whole season's young birds may have been lost.

It is difficult to know how farmers in these areas are going to be able to conserve enough food to take their cattle and sheep through the next winter.

Bird News

Firstly, reports of OTTERS from the Kenn Pier area, including some sound recordings taken on a mobile 'phone.

Also a Kingfisher, 5 Moorhen chicks and 12 Mallard ducklings on Blackditch.

At Manor Farm , Pied Wagtails had five young, which was splendid news, as there has been some evidence of a decline in numbers in this area.

Many thanks to all who provided this information to John. We love to hear your sightings and it is good to be able to report on really local matters.

There were three singing Yellowhammers along Brockley Way at the end of May, whilst Goblin Combe produced an overflying Mistle Thrush, a Nuthatch, Marsh Tit (now becoming very scarce) and a Garden Warbler.

A Hobby was flying over Kenn Moor in heavy drizzle, presumably forced to hunt in the wet by the awful weather. However it was heartening to see lots of young birds being fed along the strawberry Line and I was surprised at how many have survived the torrential rain.

On the Somerset Levels, Great White Egrets nested for the very first time in the U.K. rearing three youngsters (as seen on TV.) Meanwhile the B.T.O. reported that one of their radio fitted Cuckoos arrived back in Norfolk on the 1st May, but had left England on return migration by the 11th June!!

Swifts have been seen over Duck Lane perhaps enticed by John Croxton's nest-box with Swift call recording..

On the 21st June, Chris Sperring MBE from the Hawk and Owl Trust, ringed two well grown Barn Owl chicks in one of the Nailsea Wall boxes. Thanks to Steve Bye for permitting access and to Terry Stamp for providing a suitable ladder on site. The chicks should fledge in early July and if the birds are reported, I will provide details later the same day, a similar exercise at the YACWAG box on Congresbury Moor had go be abandoned as the eggs were just hatching - eight weeks later than their Nailsea Wall cousins!!

BUS SERVICES IN KENN

The double-decker bushes mentioned by Margaret last month are on 'First' 125 service from Weston-super-Mare to Portishead.

At Portishead, the bus becomes Service X25 and continues to Cribbs Causeway.

The service is hourly and details are on the North Somerset Council website or by a timetable leaflet from Clevedon or Yatton Library.

Also running through Kenn is the Bakers Dolphin Service 66 from Congresbury via Yatton, Clevedon and Portishead to Nailsea.

This service is operated by new comfortable low floor buses and in addition to the places mentioned above - serves Portbury Wharf Nature Reserve, Oakham Treasures, Tyntesfield and Noah's Ark Zoo Farm.
