Bird News I

Firstly, some late news from November, and apologies for its omission last month. Robert Down reported a Kingfisher perched on the edge of his swimming pool (!) – it was almost certainly a young bird looking for its own territory.

The major ornithological event in December was an influx of Leech's Petrels, blown up the Bristol Channel and Severn Estuary by the continuous gales from the 2nd to the 8th. These are small oceanic birds, their nearest breeding site is on St. Kilda and they are said to winter in the sub-tropics! The Petrels were seen all the way up the Bristol Channel (on both sides) and locally John Croxton logged a couple from Poet's Walk Clevedon.

I was alerted to an unusual bird 'dead in a puddle' at Yatton Railway Station car park and this also turned out to be a Leech's Petrel. Many died from exhaustion across the UK and it was the biggest 'wreck' of Leech's Petrels since October 1952. Coincidentally the Clevedon Mercury, it is 'Times Gone By' column reported a 'fork

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tailed petrel' shot at Portishead on 7th December 1906, 100 years, less a day, to the Yatton bird.

A bird survey walk near to the Middle Lane Fishing Lakes in Kingston Seymour produced a Woodcock, as always flushed from almost under my feet. By mid-month there were signs of a few more Fieldfares and Redwings along with small flocks of Chaffinches on the moors and also around 250 Lapwings on fields near the M5 between Clevedon and Weston.

And the rare bird, shot on Kenn Moor in 1945, was a Bittern. I was intending to write about the Leech's Petrels in 1952, but events of December 2006 have rather overtaken that.

As always, I am interested to hear of any unusual sightings, perhaps Firecrest or Brambling in your garden!

Bird News II

There are large numbers of Buzzards, Crows and Ravens hanging around where sheep are lambing in The Nailsea Wall area. They are scavenging on what is left behind after the ewes have lambed. If a ewe dies they make short work of the carcass if it is not found quickly.

A few Blackbirds and Song Thrushes have started their spring-time singing. The very mild winter had fooled them into thinking that spring is just around the corner.

As was reported last month there are very few winter visiting birds around. There are plenty of berries still on the bushes if they do arrive, also apples.

Boxing Day – Jeff has just seen a Water Rail at Nailsea and Toby Naish has seen two Kingfishers while fishing in the moor.
