PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

P.C. Kinsella attended the last meeting of the Parish Council and was able to pass on warnings about the spate of recent burglaries and other incidents.

He is hoping to set up a Community Speedwatch team in the parishes that form his beat.

This scheme is run by specially trained volunteers and monitors the speed of motorists along some of the smaller roads that have speed restrictions, such as Kenn Street. He stressed that he would not expect volunteers to work in their own villages as that could prove to be very difficult for them. They would operate in places where they were not known.

The Village of the Year Competition is still on-going, although the results will soon be released. Until then it would be helpful if any litter could be collected and disposed of.

There is a review of parish boundaries and also of the size of Parish Council (The Community Governance Review!).

At the last one the boundaries of the parish were tweaked to include Portbury House Farm, Manor Farm and other outlying properties. The Parish Council feels that this time no changes are required.

BIRD NEWS 1

It was good to read Ray's piece about the Barn Owl sightings last month, particularly as the species seems to be having a poor year.

Chris Sperring, from the Hawk and Owl Trust, checked the YACWAG boxes on Congresbury Moor and found the pair present, a nest cup formed but no egg laying.

A farmer at Backwell Common told me that his pair had only managed to fledge one chick, with two more dead in the nest box.

Even on the Peat Moors strongholds near Glastonbury there has been no sign of successful breeding this year, probably in part due to poor weather.

It is thought that the wet weather of Summer 2007 has reduced bird populations generally. The British Trust for Ornithology counts in North

Somerset show a substantial decline as do our local counts of the North Somerset levels and moors.

However bird numbers in Littlewood, on Kenn Moor, have remained stable while the Strawberry Line has recorded a significant increase. Perhaps small birds can better survive wet weather when the habitat is favourable.

John Croxton and I spent a couple of mornings exploring the footpaths around the National Trust's Tyntesfield Estate recently.

A Yellowhammer was still in song, several Buzzards and a Sparrowhawk soared over the woodland and a Peregrine gave a splendid flying display.

We found Nuthatch and Treecreeper in the woods and a large cut field of oil-seed rape held lots of feeding Finches and a couple of hundred Wood Pigeons.

Autumn is already with us as far as the birds are concerned as evidenced by a flock of 32 Lapwings feeding on a cut field on Kenn Moor. There were also two groups of Mistle Thrushes there totalling 26 birds, a party of Canada Gees and two Kingfishers on the Kenn River.

There is little sign of the Hobbies this year – they do not seem to be present at the usual site – if anybody does see one I would appreciate being told – 01934 835208 – or tell John Croxton in Duck Lane please.

Along the coast, Dunlins, Ringed Plovers and Turnstones have returned and a single Wheatear was present on the 12th.

A sea watch at Ladye Bay, Clevedon produced a Fulmar and a Gannet but Storm Petrels have been seen from Portishead – a reflection on our August 2008 weather.

A visit to Clevedon Moor

Ray's August walk was along the banks of the Yearling Rhyne at Cook's Lane. Approximately 30 walkers met as usual at Ray's home and a suitable convoy was formed and set off for our destination. On arrival we had a foretaste of what was to come as the entrance to our parking field was very muddy and presented problems to all but the brave (or foolhardy).

I recall from a previous walk in this area that Cook's Lane was named after

a farmer called Cook who was also known locally as Wiggy Cook because he wore a hairpiece.

Ray informing us that Clevedon Court Estate owned the land we were visiting and it is rented out to local farmers.

To the North we could see the tree covered slopes of the Clevedon – Tickenham ridge. Ray explained that this was once common land but as a

result of the enclosures act had been incorporated into the estate of the Elton family.

During hard times back in the early 1900s the Elton family had provided much needed employment by planting the trees we now enjoy.

Close to the start of our walk Ray pointed out a patch of land that was somewhat overgrown. During the 1st World War the Elton's allowed this to be used as allotments to help alleviate the food shortages. Whilst Ray was explaining what marvelous cover this scrubby area now made for cattle, a deer emphasized the point by making straight for it.

In times past, land on this area of Clevedon Moor was used by a Clevedon butcher called Gould and also by Yeates who kept horses here in the days when their haulage business relied on real horse power.

We walked along the banks of the Yearling Rhyne until we came to a sizeable sluice.

Ray explained that the rhyne had been substantially enlarged as part of the major drainage works when the Blind Yeo was constructed.

The Yearling Rhyne now links the Middle Yeo and Land Yeo to the Blind Yeo. The sluice maintains a head of water in these two streams, with any surplus finding its way into the sea via the Blind Yeo.

At the time of our visit the surplus was self evident, as the head of water coming over the sluice was about 1.5 to 2 meters. All that wasted energy someone should install a water turbine.

Walking further along the banks we came to a small bridge and Ray pointed out an area where sedges and rushes grew, remarking that all of the moor would once have appeared that way. He invited us to cross the bridge and visit it. We should have taken more notice of his throw away comment that he had not been there for years.

Well most took up the offer and off we set. At first all was well but soon we came across a damp area. Should we go back? No press on, round the field to the other bridge. So we kept going encouraged by the sight of John Croxton already some way ahead. If only we had known his Wellingtons were full of water – but hey, who cares we are British.

Well we soon arrived in an area that on a Dartmoor map would have been labeled 'Mire' and guess what the supposed alternative bridge did not exist. So it was every man and woman to them selves to get back to the only bridge.

Luckily John Ball in his 'Day-Glo' vest had remained there and so in the gathering gloom we had a target to aim for.

Back safely on dry land, we emptied Wellies and returned to our start point. Ray was waiting and so we had time to thank him and assure him we now understood, the natural state of the Moor.

Next visit is Manor Farm but if Ray mentions – I've not been there for years – beware!
